2010 Membership Report

We have 8 new members since June 2009. There are 3 deaths to report: Joseph Beatty of Illinois, Dr. Kazimierz Browicz of Poland and Carl Spitzer of Arizona. We have 109 members who have paid dues for 2010, of which 42 are life members. There are 19 members who paid in 2009, but have not paid dues for 2010, and 10 members who last paid dues in 2008.

The Biology Unit Annual meeting was called to order at the NTSS in Denver Colorado on Saturday June 26 at 10:00 am. Officers present were Fran Hammond, President; Alan Hanks, Vice-President and Editor; Chris Dahle, Secretary-Treasurer; Lois Hermann Director and Jack Congrove, Director. There were 4 other members or visitors attending the meeting.

Both our President and Editor would like to be replaced. We just had an election, and Fran is willing to serve. There was discussion about making the journal more appealing by using color. Alan will try scanning the cover in color, and will send a scan for use on the ATA web site. [At a subsequent discussion, Alan agreed to serve as President, so we now have an open position for a Vice President.]

There was a discussion of whether it is better to pay dues for a year at a time, or to pay for multiple years. Paying year by year provides cash flow to the unit. It was suggested that we send out copies of the journal to prospective members. This can get quite expensive. An alternative might be to send out a single page version, similar to what we put together for Washington 2006.

There was discussion about getting an editor for Paleontology. There has been no column for several issues.

There was discussion about re-classification of butterflies using new DNA evidence. Similar problems are found with other organisms.

Alan asked why people don't exhibit more. A couple of reasons are too many rules and con-flicting advice from judges.
