When Linn's took over Scott Stamp Monthly in October 2010, my single biggest letdown was that there was no "By Topic" listing in the new publication. Unfortunately, in my rush to try to overcome this apparent deficiency I went straight to the listings rather than reading the preface material.

Until now, I never noticed the obvious box preceding the listings for United States issues. Clearly stated in this box is the fact that the By Topics listings *were* being created by the Linn's staff, but were available online and not in the monthly published issues.

With apologies for my failure to spot the obvious, I am including immediately below an update going back to the beginning of the Linn's run (October 2010) of all of the items listed that I missed in that intervening time.

Moving into personal preference territory

Zazzle is a company franchised by the USPS to print custom postage stamps. They are accessible on the web at *http://www.zazzle.com*. They offer a variety products, but for us "Photo gifts, Postage" are relevant. Generally they offer three sizes of custom stamps: small $(1.8'' \times 1.3'')$, medium $(2.1'' \times 1.3'')$, and large $(2.5'' \times 1.5'')$ that range between \$18.95 and \$20.95 per sheet of $20 \times 0.45 stamps.

For the purposes of this review, I entered the Zazzle web site using the following address *http://www.zazzle,com/mushroom+stamps* and was rewarded with a catalog of 1116 available "mushroom" related stamps. It is completely unclear from their site, but I suspect that this is a catalog, much like the Sears or J.C. Penny catalogs. It advertises available products, but does not necessarily reflect, as does the Scott, Yvert, or Michel catalogs, stamps actually sold and used in the mail stream. Since I am uncertain as to how many, or even if any, of these items have seen postal use, or even have been purchased for potential postal use, I will present a summary of what I found when reviewing the 19 "pages" of images (60 images per page) of available stamps.

For the purposes of organizing my personal collection I have distinguished several general types of stamps: Stamps with mushrooms as the main subject in the vignette (M); Stamps with mushrooms in the design, but that are not the primary subject of the vignette (D); Stamps with mushroom look-alike vignettes (such as rock formations, ceramic mushrooms, A-bomb mushroom clouds, etc.) that look like, but are not actually mushrooms (X); and, stamps with mycologists as the subject of the vignette (P).

My summary will use these categories, with the addition of subcategories relating to the presentation (realistic [photo or accurate drawing] or fanciful [stylized drawing or outright cartoon]) in the vignette. Also, in the "D" group, I have distinguished mushrooms as food and graphic stamps (words but no illustration, or illustrations of completely fanciful "mushrooms."

Mushrooms as main subject: Realistic (375) and Fanciful (158)

Mushrooms as a design element: Realistic (38), Fanciful (317), Food (41), and Graphic (26)

Mushroom look-alikes: Realistic (11) and Fanciful (1)

Mycologists: None seen

This accounts for 967 of the 1116 images sorted as "mushroom." An additional pattern was not illustrated on the web site and is not included. The remaining 148 images did not contain identifiable mushroom(s) although stamps with fairies or Alice-in-Wonderland might liberally be added to a thematic collection by association (fairy rings of mushrooms, and the psychedelic mushrooms used in the Alice story). Others may also be so included, but I have chosen not to add them in.

A minor note here. Prices for these Zazzle offerings average slightly over \$1.00 for each stamp, but are only available in sheets of 20. Thus the 967 patterns would cost a collector somewhere around \$20,000 (unless he or she could muster 19 friends to take the surplus). And, I repeat my earlier observation as a caution: It is unclear that any of these 950+ stamps has seen use as postage.
