

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The United States Postal Service will issue a new series of postage stamps commencing in May, 2010, in cooperation with the Greeting Card Association. The idea is to let customers for greeting cards know how much postage to use on the non-standard size envelopes. The first stamp in the series shows a Monarch butterfly and it is planned that further issues will show other butterflies. Greeting card manufacturers are supposed to print a silhouette image of a butterfly in the upper right-hand corner of their envelopes with the phrase "butterfly stamp or equivalent postage required". The new value is 64c, as shown in the examples above. The first day was at Monarch, MT and a butterfly image was used in the cancellation. Unfortunately, they used the Viceroy as the image, which is a mimic of the Monarch!
