These stamps are part of an issue which includes 42 stamps as 6 miniature sheets of 6 different and 6 souvenir sheets. The sheets and souvenir sheets form 6 sets of 1 MS & 1 SS each with the following themes: flowers, orchids, mushrooms, butterflies, birds and animals.

Obviously it has been a very slow quarter (Oct-Dec 2003) for new listings (by Scott) of mushroom related stamp issues. So, given the small amount of information, I wish to appeal to those of you who collect materials related to mushrooms on stamps. By that I mean: Mycologists on stamps; Lichens on stamps; mushrooms, lichens or mycologists in a design not related specifically to them; mushrooms, lichens, mushrooms, or mycologists in the selvedge of a souvenir sheet or in an attached

Cinderella; lichens or mycologists on postal stationery (postal cards, embossed envelopes, etc.); etc., etc.

Of concern to me is the limited number of 'in design' patterns and the total lack of postal stationery in this column since I took it over from Norma McCumber. I believe that this material is still being issued worldwide. But, I have not succeeded in locating a reliable source for information about this collateral material.
