#### A New Checklist of Mammals of the World

For the past decade the identification of mammal species on stamps has been based on the 1993 second edition of Mammal Species of the World, edited by D.E.Wilson & D.M.Reeder (Smithsonian Press). As all biophilatelic collectors will appreciate, this is a lengthy period of time, especially considering the advances in geneticism which have resulted in the identification of many more "new" species in all fields of fauna and flora. The sixth edition of Walker's Mammals of the World, R.M.Nowak (Johns Hopkins) published in 1999 provided updated information, but the baseline information continued to use Wilson & Reeder from 1993.

In April 2004, Mammals of the World, A Checklist by Andrew Duff and Ann Lawson was published by A & C Black and will, for time being, be consulted as an updated version of Wilson & Reeder. Those who have used Wilson & Reeder will know that this volume contains a vast amount of information on the origins of each species named and will therefore continue to be consulted as the new publication, herein noted as Duff & Lawson, is purely a checklist of species. The actual information given for each species is Latin name, English name, plus brief distribution details. The listing is based at genus level on Wilson & Reeder, which usefully provides a continuation of information. Above this level, the higher classifications follow the arrangement of McKenna & Bell from 2002. I am not attempting to explain this change of system as it is somewhat complicated and includes many more levels and sublevels. Anyone who requires this information is advised to consult the new book or e-mail me and I will try to provide understandable details. As far as the continued listings of mammals in Biophilately is concerned, there will be a few changes noted at family level, the only major one to be noted here being that, the New World Primates that used to be under the family name of Cebidae will now be under Atelidae.

At genus level, Duff & Lawson provide the following information in their introduction as to the current number of recognised mammal species. Wilson & Reeder listed 4629 species, which has been reduced by 41 by the ommision of all species that became extinct during the period 1500-1799. A further reduction of 41 species is due to their being demoted into synonymy during 1993-2002. Finally, new species listed during the period 1993-2002 total 522, which gives a current figure of 5069, which as

Duff & Lawson note is the first time that the number of mammals has topped the 5000 figure. While some of these new species are obviously newly indentified, the majority are due in the main to the genetic splitting of previous species into one or more full species. Again, with 522 new species, there is far to much information to detail fully in this brief article and I will try to mention most changes in my introductions to future listings. I have already been using some changes which may have been noted, bw gorilla species instead of one and similarly two orangutan species instead of one. Another interesting change is that where Wilson & Reeder lumped all baboon species into a single species, Duff & Lawson re-establish the previous number of 5 species. In a coming listing I will therefore provide details of the changes to the baboon species on stamps listed since 1993. Another fundamental change is that many domestic mammals have been given their own species name to distinguish them from wild populations. Again, I will detail these in a future listing, as in some cases the change in name has been to the domestic species while in others it is to the wild species. Finally, I will mention one other change that at present I prefer to ignore. Wilson & Reeder changed the small cats under the genus Felis to a number of new genus names. Duff & Lawson have returned all species back to Felis but with the addition of the subgenera name. For example, the Bobcat which under Wilson & Reeder was Lynx rufus would now be correctly listed as Felis (Lynx) rufus. I find this simply extra work and prefer to continue using Wilson & Reeder rather than changing everything back again to how it used to be! If anyone wishes to use the changes it should be remembered that all cat species will be under the genus Felis except for Acinonyx, Neofelis and Panthera. It would be interesting to know if there is to be a new edition of Wilson & Reeder at some time in the future and to then note which changes have been included there.

At the end of Duff & Lawson, an appendix very usefully details all changes from the 1993 listing of Wilson & Reeder together with a source for each change and a bibliography of these sources. All in all, an extremely welcome addition to my library which will see much use in the future.
